# **Dear South Orangetown Community,**

This fall, we have celebrated the academic, artistic and athletic achievements of many of our Tappan Zee High School students. From National Merit Scholarship Commended Students to AP Scholars, NYSSMA All-State and Area-All State musicians to Section 1 champions, it is an exciting time in South Orangetown! Honor society inductions have begun and we have launched several new enrichment programs, as well as our Boys Varsity



Volleyball team. By the time you read this, the TZ Players will have presented their fall play and winter concert season will be underway.

As I visit our schools, observing and interacting with so many students, staff and parents, I am impressed by the quality of instruction, number of programs and the breadth of opportunities outside of the school day. Every student is encouraged to explore their interests through enrichments, clubs, sports and/or performing arts as we continue to work to achieve 100 percent participation. Families are engaged, too! We've had record attendance at our curriculum nights, Food Truck & Trunk or Treat and athletic events.

We are preparing to break ground on our Capital Improvements Project in Summer 2024, with Phase 1 construction beginning at William O. Schaefer Elementary School and Cottage Lane Elementary School. This work, which will be scheduled over two years, will include classroom renovations, HVAC upgrades and a redesign of the CLE main entrance. Plans for Phase 2 construction at TZHS were submitted in late September for New York State Education Department review. Phase 3 planning for renovations at South Orangetown Middle School are in progress.

In January, SOCSD will administer a School Community Survey for students, parents, staff and community members. The web-based survey is designed to gather input about how we are doing as a District in many areas at various grade levels. We want to hear from you.

# **SOCSD in Action:** Preparing Active Citizens



Student voice is cultivated from the early grades in SOCSD. Both elementary schools have active student councils, composed of representatives elected by their peers, which work to enhance their school communities—just as they do at the secondary level.

Through Social Studies, ELA and Character Education programming across all grades, students develop and practice critical thinking, collaboration and communication skills through lessons that draw from real world situations. They are also provided with a variety of opportunities to contribute to their school communities through service-oriented activities and extracurriculars and, for grades K-8, involvement with school-based recycling and composting programs.





Middle and high school students also have a say in building and district-level decision making by serving on advisory groups and interview committees for school administrator positions.

# New Credential for Grads!

TZHS students now have the opportunity to earn the New York State Seal of Civic Readiness distinction on their high school transcript and diploma. The Seal was developed as a component of the Board of Regents Civic Readiness Initiative, which aims to further strengthen civics education statewide and empower students to become engaged citizens.

To obtain the Seal of Civic Readiness, a student must complete all requirements for a New York State local or Regents diploma and earn a total of six points, with at least two points in Civic Knowledge and at least two points in Civic Participation. Students may also earn points by completing a Capstone project.

# SOMS Earns School of Distinction Designation



Last month, SOMS Principal **Chad Corey, Ed.D.**, Assistant Principal **Danielle Rodriguez Ed.D.** and Math teacher **Allyn Flaherty** presented on using data to transform math support at the Association for Middle Level Education's Annual Conference in National Harbor, MD. The middle school was one of just 11 schools nationwide to be named a 2023 AMLE School of Distinction.

The Schools of Distinction program recognizes exemplary schools while supporting them through a process of strategic vision setting to help foster ongoing growth and success. Last year, SOMS completed a rigorous review process that measured implementation of middle grades best practices and continuous improvement plans. AMLE highlighted SOMS' strengths, including the structure and work of the School Support Team and efforts to incorporate student voice into the school culture and foster a welcoming, inclusive and affirmative environment.

"In our continued pursuit of excellence, we seek opportunities to evaluate ourselves through research-based best practices," reported Corey.

# **Expanding Extracurriculars** Helps Drive Engagement

Over the past decade, SOCSD has invested in hands-on, project-based learning, flexible learning environments, high-interest electives and compelling academic enrichment—from author visits to field trips—to provide exciting, exceptional educational experiences for our students.

These efforts also extend beyond the school day. Understanding that student participation in extracurriculars is linked positively to academic performance, attendance, behavior and a sense of belonging, SOCSD has expanded its offerings to tap into students' curiosity, diverse interests and, in some cases, career aspirations.

Last year, 60 percent of students in grades K-5 and 75 percent of those in grades 6-12 enrolled in at least one extracurricular or sport. Administrators are working to further boost engagement by identifying and addressing barriers that may keep some students from participating. All schools are creating unique events within the school day to ensure that all students are able to engage in these signature SOCSD experiences.



For our youngest students, enrichment programs offer a fun environment for learning and practicing new skills, such as teamwork and public speaking.

From Creative Crocheting to Lego Master Builders to Running Club, CLE hosts more than 20 enrichment programs throughout the school year. Six new clubs were launched in 2023-24 alone, with the goal of having every student participate in at least one.

Extracurriculars can also give students the opportunity to extend classroom learning in areas that they are passionate about.

This year, the long-standing SOMS Debate Club is using podcasting to help members prepare for debates.

On October 23, the SOCSD Family Engagement Center hosted its first Parent University, a collection of mini-workshops to help families navigate everything from accessing academic resources to vaping prevention. SOMS Prevention Counselor Bobbie-Angela Wong, LMSW led a session on kids' mental health and answered questions parents frequently ask.

### WHEN SHOULD I BE CONCERNED?

Two guiding questions can help when you are noticing a change in your child's behavior, mood or interests: What is the intention behind the change? Is the change interfering with their ability to function?

It is important to look at the extremes. Attention is generally given to students who are failing in some way. However, we do not always pay enough attention to those who seem "perfect." A healthy balance is important for mental health.

### HOW DO I HELP MY CHILD FIND BALANCE?

- Create a structured routine that includes time to engage in fun activities that do not have any pressure associated with them.
- Role model how to be a flexible problem solver when things do not go according to plan.
- Monitor and establish guidelines for technology and social media use. Communicate openly that the intent of these limits is for your child to use their time to pursue other things they enjoy doing.

### HOW DO I TALK WITH MY CHILD ABOUT MY CONCERNS?

"Hey, I'm concerned. I'm noticing..." is a good place to start.

Open communication does not plant a seed in your child's mind. When you ask about mental health, you let your child know that you're there for them. It is important to use "I" statements; "I'm noticing" comes from a place of love and care.




TZ Varsity Football jersey #75 was retired at the end of the 2023 season in honor of alumnus and former captain Blaise Winter (TZHS Class of '80).

"We were thrilled to have 2010 TZ Athletics Hall of Fame inductee and 11-year NFL veteran **Blaise Winter** come back to spend the week in his hometown," said Director of Physical Education, Health and Athletics **Bill Pilla**. "To honor him at our game and for him to do the coin toss on Senior Night was a treat. His story is a testament to the fact that, with hard work and determination, anything is possible."
